LEAF Workshops 2019

1. “You CAN Make a Difference In How Legislators Vote! Faith In Action!” Donna Schneweis Chair of the KCADP Board This Capitol based workshop begins with fundamental, practical information on advocacy that makes a difference with public policy makers. Following that input, participants will be able to attend committee hearings, the Senate session, and/or visit their own legislators’ offices. Workshop leader, Donna Schneweis has been a registered lobbyist focusing on opposition to the death penalty in Kansas for over 20 years. She has seen how legislators are impacted by those cards, letters, emails and visits from constituents! This is a 2 hour workshop limited to the first 15 registrants. Do not request this workshop if you took it last year.
2. “Brown vs Board of Education” Museum tour Brown v. Board of Education National Historic Site was established in Topeka, Kansas, on October 26, 1992, by the United States Congress to commemorate the landmark U.S. Supreme Court decision aimed at ending racial segregation in public schools. This is a two hour tour that is limited to 12 participants.
3. “Challenges Of Foster Care In Kansas” Benet Magnuson The Kansas foster care system is in crisis. Over the past 6 years, the number of Kansas children in foster care has increased dramatically, year after year. Kansas now has one of the highest rates of children in foster care in the country - nearly twice the national average. Kansas children in foster care experience extreme placement instability, moving from placement to placement at a rate more than double the state's standard. Benet Magnuson, executive director for the nonprofit advocacy organization Kansas Appleseed, will provide an overview of the foster care crisis, as well as recommendations to strengthen families and to rebuild hope for Kansas kids.
4. “Equality Kansas” Brett Hoedl - Chair, KC Metro Chapter Kansas is one of twenty-nine states where it is completely legal to be fired, denied housing or denied service for the simple fact of being a member of the LGBTQ community. Equality Kansas was formed in 2005 in response to the Kansas Marriage amendment that banned same-sex marriage and since then we have been present in Topeka and in our local communities to fight back against discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation or gender identity. Come learn about how you can get involved and help make Kansas a more accepting community for all of its citizens!
5. “Friends of the Kaw” Kansas River-keeper Dawn Buehler Did you know that 800,000 Kansans get their drinking water from the Kansas River? Come and learn about what is being done to protect this valuable resource and what you can do to help. Join us for an open discussion about water in Kansas!
6. “Game On for Kansas Schools” Judith Deedy Game On for Kansas Schools is a nonpartisan grassroots public education advocacy group. Since 2010, we have been working to engage community members in public education advocacy to help ensure Kansas schools have the resources they need to serve the children in their districts. Our workshop will educate attendees on critical funding and policy issues and how to effectively advocate for them, whether that means having conversations with parents on the soccer field, contacting legislators, or helping friends and family members understand their legislators’ voting records.

7. “Expand Medicaid” Alliance for a Healthy Kansas” April Holman Today, more than 150,000 Kansans fall into a health coverage gap, making too much money to qualify for KanCare and too little to afford private insurance. We have the opportunity to expand the KanCare program to cover the gap. Find out how Kansas came to be one of the last states to expand and what you can do about it. Expand Medicaid!
8. “Meet a Muslim” The Crescent Peace Society Ahsan Latif Have you heard a lot about Muslims? Here's a chance to sit down face to face and actually meet Kansas Muslims! These events are a collaborative opportunity for people of different faiths to come together and get to know one another in small groups. Join us for friendly conversation and mutual understanding!
9. "What does the Kansas Silver Haired Legislature actually do?" Don Woodward, Speaker, Kansas Silver Haired Legislature The history, purpose, mission, and goals of the Silver Haired Legislature. How to become a Silver Haired Legislator and what are the proposed Bills and Resolutions for 2019?
10. “The Grateful Heart of Medicaid” Karen Flateau Karen Flateau became a paraplegic in her late forties after a very active life. She had worked in science museums and nursing homes, and enjoyed daily horseback riding. Due to a rare disease, she found herself unemployed, one thousand miles from immediate family, and emotionally lost. Hear her stories of finding her way in the Medicaid system and her deepening faith. How can we as legislators and persons of faith help the special needs of residents of our state? Let’s turn “thoughts and prayers” into policy and action. We will focus on health care and needs of the mentally and physically challenged of our community.
11. League of Women Voters “Diversity, Equity and Inclusion” Cille King and Teresa Briggs, Co-Presidents, League of Women Voters of Kansas Diversity, equity, and inclusion are mutually reinforcing. Diversity, equity, and inclusion are central to the League of Women Voters’ current and future success in engaging all individuals, households, communities, and policy makers in creating a more perfect democracy.
12. Kansas Interfaith Action Rabbi Moti Rieber. Executive Director, Kansas Interfaith Action Becoming a Citizen Lobbyist: How Faith Communities can Engage in the legislative process by working with Kansas Interfaith Action to address issues of poverty, racism, violence, and environmental devastation. Rabbi Rieber will share how KIFA brings a broader, more inclusive moral lens to the work of our state legislature, inviting clergy and faith leaders as well as their communities to speak to legislators about the kind of Kansas we want to live to live in.
13. “Mass Incarceration and the New Jim Crow” Marge Zakoura-Vaughan and Gwen Sharpe More people are behind bars in the US (2.2 million) than there are living in many major cities, including Phoenix, Philadelphia, San Antonio, San Diego, and Dallas. You, as women of faith, are invited to critically explore our country’s criminal justice system and how our “War on Drugs” and anti-immigration climate disproportionately incarcerate black, brown, and poor white people. Presenters are two of the Kansas Women who journeyed to New York for a seminar on Criminalization of Communities of Color and Mass Incarceration, held at the Church Center for the United Nations in New York City. They will share information, concern, and opportunities for social and legislative action. What can we do? Join the Dialogue! Follow through with advocacy!

Changes for United Methodist Women Program Resources

Beginning in January 2019, United Methodist Women Mission Resources will no longer stock books on the Reading Program list. What this means:

You will no longer be able to order books on the Reading Program lists from United Methodist Women Mission Resources. You will be able to purchase books from Cokesbury, Amazon and other major retailers, often at less cost than offered by Mission Resources. If you purchase from Amazon, the books are shipped free if you are a Prime member. If you purchase through the Amazon Smile program, a donation is made with each order to United Methodist Women. To learn more about Amazon Smile, visit smile.amazon.com. (Choose the United Methodist Women in New York, NY, to support the national office.)

You will no longer be able to order United Methodist Women resources on consignment for your event and return what was not sold. You will be able to order a free sample box that contains several United Methodist Women resources to display and keep at no charge to you. You may take orders from members onsite or let them know how to place their own orders. You will be able to purchase quantities of United Methodist Women mission resources for your event that you may sell. These will not be returnable.

What about Mission u?

Members expect to be able to purchase the books at the school. Deans will let attendees know well in advance that books should be purchased before traveling to Mission u. Conferences can also purchase books to sell onsite. Books not sold during the event may not be returned but can be sold at future events.

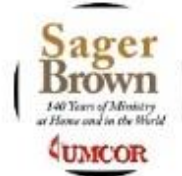
